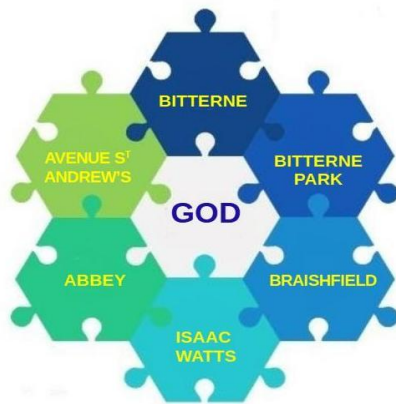

Jim Ramshaw 1943-2026

Jim joined our Sunday School in 1952 at the age of 9 years, also becoming involved with the Life Boys (the younger section of the Boys Brigade as it was then known). This led to a lifetime of service in the Brigades. Harry and Madge Downer were his Sunday School teachers and they met at 2.45pm on Sunday afternoons.

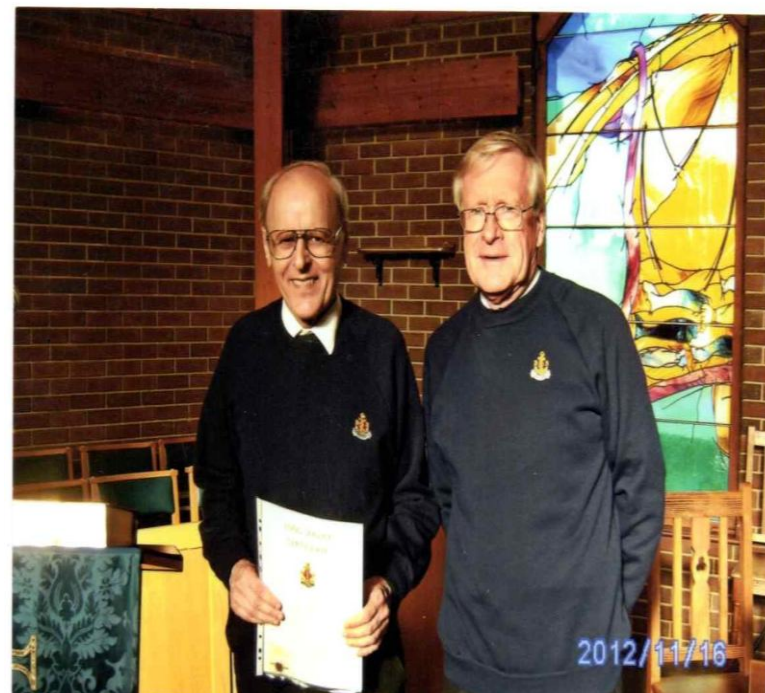
Under the guidance of Ken Trapp and Ken Leach (BB Officers), Jim moved through the ranks and was acting Captain for a time in the 1980's. In 1983, Jim went to Glasgow to join the BB Centenary celebrations, he also attended displays in the Royal Albert Hall in London and visited Denmark with the Brigade Band.

Jim became a member of our church in 1967 and served as an Elder for some time; he was very much instrumental in raising funds for the church extension built in 2000, raising some £50,000 through applying for grants.

Jim sadly suffered severe bouts of ill health some years ago and moved into a care home where he was very happy and well looked after. Only a week before his sudden passing, he was playing table tennis at a games evening!

He will be much missed by all who knew him and long remembered for his many years of service to this church and his Lord and his influence on so many Brigade boys over the years, not least for the way he led football teams and took them for "drill"!

I still treasure a certificate for modelmaking signed by Jim 60 years ago when I was a BB boy. We give thanks for his service and loyalty and extend our deepest sympathies to his sister Patsy and brother David and their families. *Ian Abrahams*

Anthony Boys report – January 2026.

Let's start this off with a high: I have been promoted to Lieutenant in the Boys Brigade in December, which means I have more authority to help carry out the activities our now many boys are enjoying each week.

Just after Christmas, I went out to visit Uganda, to perform 'round 2' of visiting. I saw a few places that I saw last time. I had a much smaller window of time, due to upcoming elections and the anticipated problems what resulted therefrom. It allowed me to have a general meeting, and further one day with each Member of Mercy Collective. I also had enough spare time to look around the local market to get some Ugandan-tailored 'Kitenge' shirts, most of which were pre-made, but I also had some made-to-measure during a tour of a seamstress's workshop!

On the plus side, the poultry project is thriving. The funds that the church helped to raise have allowed for the establishment of a hatchery. Chickens can be either kept for egg laying, eaten, sold, or even bartered for other animals!

The mechanics workshop, intended to provide livelihoods, is also underway; but needs significant investment and help.

Sadly, some of the situations have in fact worsened. The church that I wished to twin our church with has since failed. Many of the villagers still live in the same conditions. There are still plenty of children missing out on their education. Quite a few widows are still isolated with no assistance. A widespread lack of rain led to crop failure of maize, beans, and other essential foodstuffs; however more adapted plants were able to survive, such as bananas and cassava.

I did try to begin setting up a Boys Brigade over there, but internet shutdowns and other delaying factors meant this didn't happen during my time. However, I am still in touch with the relevant people, and things are slowly moving along.

In other news, as soon as I came back from Africa, I went straight to East London to see a few community projects as part of my course that I am partaking in with the URC. I saw how the local initiative turned abandoned buildings into community hubs such as a homeless shelter and a community cafe, and took an abandoned plot of land and restored it into a sports ground and community garden. They even made a sculpture out of knives that were surrendered into a 'knife bin' that was outside one of these community centres.

Overall, I feel I am learning a lot from the course, and hopefully by the time that the course concludes, that I will be able to summarise the information and have it useful to the Church, the BB and the Uganda projects.

For the previous module of my course, one of my assignments was to reflect on a new way of prayer – I decided to write about how the Ugandans partake in 'cyber-prayer', either via SMS or via social media. It proves that the Spirit connects with us beyond the conventional spoken / written word; that God is with us in all formats and dimensions. It also allows people to connect and pray together who are physically apart.

Summary of Outreach community activities (Nov 2025 - Jan 2026)

Hello everyone,

It's been a wonderfully busy and exciting festive season across our church and community. As we've moved through Advent, Christmas, and into the New Year, I'm grateful for the chance to share some highlights from the past couple of months.

Building Connections & Community Partnerships

I've continued strengthening relationships with local churches, charities, and community groups, meeting with leaders from St Mary's Sholing, St Francis Valley Park, SVS, Connect Hampshire, Youth Options, and others. These conversations are helping us widen our welcome and explore new ways of working together. Brigade volunteering opportunities have been shared with sixth forms, colleges, universities, and volunteer platforms, with follow-up to potential helpers. I've also been in touch with groups involved in the Christmas Tree Festival and future events, helping us plan for next year.

Communications, Website & Social Media

Our digital presence has had a refresh, with updates across the website including services, news, eco content, senior citizens, hiring spaces, "find us," Southern Fellowship, and our 40th Anniversary pages. Quick links have been added to the homepage to make navigation easier. Social media has been lively too, with posts for Christmas events, January services, room hire, and all our 40th Anniversary celebrations. I also created reels, carousels, and interactive stories for the Christmas Tree Festival, and set up an Instagram Linktree to help people find key information more easily.

Creative Projects & Events

There's been lots of design work recently, including flyers for Christmas services, weddings, baptisms, membership, "about us," room hire, and drafts for the musical afternoon and reunion service.

I've developed 40th Anniversary logo ideas, created a dedicated webpage, and set up Facebook events for the full year of celebrations. The Christmas Tree Festival was a joy to support — from gathering photos and videos for engagement posts to meeting many of the groups decorating their trees.

Training & Looking Ahead

I'm pleased to share that I've now completed the full Mental Health First Aid course, alongside attending Roofbreaker introductory training, the Count Everyone In Inclusive Christmas service, continuing Children's Ministry training, and booking onto GDPR training. Looking ahead, we're building momentum for the 40th Anniversary year, future volunteering opportunities, and new community partnerships. Conversations are underway about an Outreach Community Working Group, livestreaming, Memory Café possibilities, and inclusive services.

I'm excited for what's ahead and grateful for everyone who's been part of this journey so far. Thank you for the chance to keep serving as your Outreach Community Worker.

Why LYCIG Matters (Leading Your Church Into Growth)

Anne, Philippa, and I went on a course recently and I want to tell you why it is important to everybody.

Our world is a very different place to what it was in our childhood, and if we don't adapt to the modern world, we will die as a church.

In our youth there were no computers or streaming services to bring 24/7 culture into our homes. On a Sunday it was a rest day and people went to church as a matter of course, it was the centre of life in the local area on that day, as the pubs didn't open until a lot later, and it was more suitable for families.

But today, there are a lot of distractions, and we have been groomed by social media to expect instant success. So, a church like ours, who has the added disadvantage of not being in the main shopping area and being above their eyeline, will seem intimidating and boring to the main population. As religion is not about instant gratification or success, but about service to God and spreading God's love to the world, it does not fit in to current culture.

I am not saying that we need to be like the current 24/7 culture where the focus is on "me" and the timescale is now, but I think that we need to go out into the community, identify the needs of our community, and try to address it.

For example: the modern community is not a community in the traditional sense, where everybody was part of a local wider family. Today our area is home to several different cultures and ethnic groups who live apart without many bridge builders.

Also, the local gathering places like pubs, local shops and local banks, are in steep decline – so people tend not to go so often to the local centres as they did even 10 years ago. The temptation now is to stay in the home and watch television, shop online or scroll through social media – all of which are passive time wasters and do not develop our social skills.

Humans are social animals and to feel good we need social interaction. Unfortunately, COVID was a severe blow and handicap to that and a lot of

people have affected emotionally by the lockdown imposed by the government of the day, and we still have to work hard to counteract that.

This course that we went on is designed to equip congregations to go out into today's fractured communities and help them to find the seekers looking for God, looking for something more than today's culture can offer them. We need to overcome their suspicions that have been encouraged by modern culture and show the world at large that we can fulfil the need for human, face to face friendship that they do not realise that they need.

We have already started on this road by Identifying our problem and employing an Outreach Community Worker to raise awareness of us in the local community. Now we need to build on this by identifying the community's needs and showing that we can fulfil them by supplying the gathering places that are so lacking today and by showing them the love of God.

We need to act now – tomorrow is too late.

New funding for church repairs and VAT changes

The Listed Places of Worship Grants Scheme has been a lifeline for historic churches – saving them 20 per cent on repair costs. But the future of the scheme is uncertain – and churches, chapels, meeting houses and cathedrals across the country will be paying up to a fifth more for repairs, like leaking roofs and crumbling towers. Some of them cannot afford to do these repairs anymore, putting heritage and church buildings across the country at risk of disrepair and closure.

On the 22 January 2026, the UK Government confirmed the Listed Places of Worship Grant Scheme will end in March 2026. It will be replaced by a £230 million package to protect and preserve heritage buildings, including listed places of worship. The UK Government has also decided that a spending cap/limit of £25,000 will now apply for each grant, and that the overall budget of the scheme has been reduced by almost half.

The scheme offers tremendous value for money. For every £1 invested in a church building, £16 of social good is generated, for example food banks, warm spaces, clubs etc. The Trust strongly believes that the Grants scheme should be retained and made permanent – it's vital to help these buildings stay open, serving local people, and it's the poorest and most isolated who will suffer most if these buildings are forced to close. Churches depend overwhelmingly on volunteers so the new proposed scheme will need to be simple, accessible and predictable if it is to be a success. A major concern is that in future listed places of worship will have to bear the full cost of VAT on repairs. This brings to an end a system that has operated successfully for over 20 years. It means that in future local people will have to raise money not just to repair churches but to pay a 20% tax to the Government."

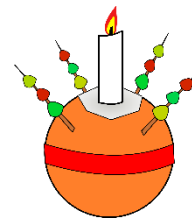
The Trust says "Museums and galleries offering free admission do not have to pay VAT on repairs, but in future churches will. We call on the Government to end this unfairness and not to expect local volunteers to pay these extra taxes."

The Department of Culture, Media and Sport have now been given their budget for the next few years. It is now up to them to decide if they will fund the scheme. Please write to your MP to request that the Listed Places of Worship Scheme is made permanent - a template and more information can be found at <https://www.nationalchurchestrust.org/impact/campaigns/save-listed-places-worship-grants-scheme> as a final decision is expected very soon.

Over 13000 churches have benefitted from the scheme and have been supported in keeping their buildings windproof and watertight, safeguarding the future of some of our most important local heritage. We have 2 listed churches near us, Holy Saviour and Church of the Ascension in Bitterne Park. The scheme changes will also greatly affect old churches in small towns and villages.

Unbelievably, there remains no VAT chargeable if a listed church is demolished.

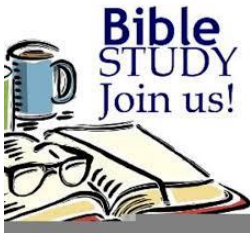
